### Make Predictions

"What will happen if we turn this knob?"



### Ask Simple ?s

"Where is the soap?"



### Point to Words

"This word says, soap."



### Notice Letters in Words

"Cold has the letter C, like our school, Cozy Kids."


### Make Comments

### Be Playful

### Notice Sounds in Words

### Make Silly Rhymes

### Follow the Child's Lead

### Talk About Reading "Conventions"

"What does this say on our schedule?"

### Make Verbal References

"Look! This is the letter C!  
C stands for cold water."
